The Nicene Creed

Prayers of Intercession

A week after Easter and, while we know that Christ is risen, it is not easy to see what difference that has made. We are tired of being socially distanced, of worshipping through masks or through screens, we want to sit and chat and hug and be normal again. We are confused, tired and frightened and generally fed up. Even the weather seems confused, and Easter joy seemed in short supply, even before Friday's news. Forgive us, Lord, that we are all finding life tough. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

We give thanks for the life of Prince Philip. For his dedication to Her Majesty, his dedication to public service, his dedication to so much that matters – his work for the environment, his support for the Commonwealth, for industry, for education, for young people, for so much that has been good and positive. We cannot imagine what it must be like to live your life in the public gaze, the focus of criticism and anger – and we pray especially for Her Majesty and all the members of her family as they mourn in the public gaze. So many people have experienced death and bereavement in the last year, so many have had to mourn with so many limitations – we pray for those whose job it is to organise his funeral in these Covid times. We ask for your peace and blessing as we commend him to God. We give thanks for your promise that you are the resurrection and the life, that Easter transforms everything. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

We know that at this stage after Easter the disciples must also have been feeling confused, tired and frightened. Most of them had seen the Risen Christ, but what did it mean? Thomas had not – he could not believe. Thank you Lord that they stayed together, there were there for each other, and their faith was rewarded. May we learn from them, support and love each other. We pray for our churches, for those with whom we worship, for those we have not seen for ages, for our work and mission together. We pray for our friends in Allestree Churches Together, for the life of this diocese, for our bishops, Libby and Malcolm. pray that we, that our Churches, may speak of faith, resurrection, and the future – that we may not just remember the past. We pray too for Adam and Billie as they prepare for their wedding at St Edmund's on Saturday – and we ask your blessing on them both. May they have a long and happy marriage. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

We pray for our country, for our leaders at National and local level. We pray for the easing of restrictions tomorrow, for all who are excited by the prospect, for those who are frightened, and those who are so tired. We pray for care, for realism, for love and understanding. We think of those whose job it is to make sure we move forward safely, for all businesses, organisations, groups and individuals as we move into whatever the new normal will be. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

We pray for those in our health services. For many who are scared at where the loosening of restrictions will lead. For those who are caring for seriously ill and dying people – the news that "only 50 have died", or the focus on a man of 99, is no consolation if your loved one is one of the 50, or has died too young. For all who continue to battle this disease. We pray for our friends in hospital, for all undergoing medical treatment. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

We know that Covid is not the only battle being fought. We think of the scenes from Mozambique, Myanmar, and closer to home in Northern Ireland. Lord, petrol bombs and water cannons are images we thought we would never see again. We pray for young people seduced by the excitement of violence and the encouragement of others, we pray for so many people who want to keep the peace they worked so hard to achieve, and we pray for politicians who seem to have learned so little about how peace needs to be constantly worked for. We pray for calm, wise heads, for a way forward that brings communities together. There is evil

that needs to be fought, we ask for your strength. Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

We remember Prince Philip and all those who have died, we give thanks for the promise of resurrection. Help us, Lord, to have faith as we journey in Easter light. And we pray, as Jesus taught us: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name: thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.
